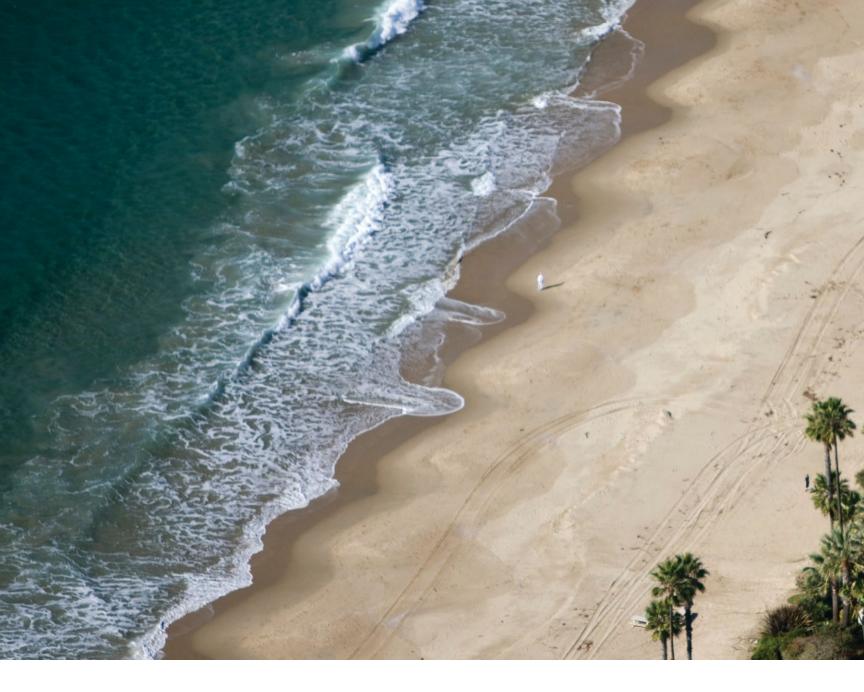

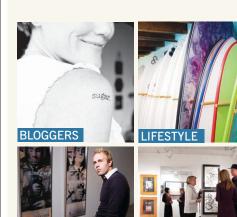

## PEDALING PROMISES

When it comes to turning "green," Newport Beach bicyclists are getting the green light. Thanks to \$9.4 million in funding approved by the Orange County Transportation Authority—to be shared among OC's cities—Newport, with matching funds, will receive a total of \$1,492,920 for bike lane improvements on San Joaquin Hills, Spy Glass Hill and Jamboree Roads and Eastbluff Drive. Expect to see new bike lanes and trails, bridges and crossings for cyclists, in addition to improved signs and bike racks. ## **OC** Collects

OCMA celebrates its Golden Anniversary with a much-anticipated exhibit.

rtists come in many sizes and forms. All have eclectic styles, including the talented Ed Ruscha, Mary Heilmann, John Altoon, Chaz Bojorquez and, especially, Andy Warhol. Individually, each possesses the creative, magical fire that draws patrons like honey seducing a grizzly bear. Experience the works of these artists and 45 others when Orange County Museum of Art (OCMA) presents this group of artistic diversity with their exhibit "OC Collects." OCMA is also celebrating its 50th anniversary as one of the most celebrated museums in the country. Art connoisseurs will enter a world of potent imagination and innovative brilliance with "OC Collects."

#### Two Heads are Better Than One

Although OCMA Director Dennis Szakacs and Chief Curator Dan Cameron worked together in New York many years ago, "OC Collects" is their first opportunity to act as collaborating curators. "The great thing about our relationship is that at our core, we have many of the same instincts about what is important in art," Dennis says. "Dan has different observations than I would. And that 'give and take' is exciting because you end up learning from each other." Mirroring Dennis' sentiments, Dan adds: "We have this ... telepathic sort of way of working."

This professional symbiosis has fueled their desire to make "OC Collects" one of the most significant exhibitions in the museum's history. Featuring works by international and domestic artists, including those who live in Southern California, the show highlights both OCMA veterans and first-time exhibitors. When Dan was hired as chief curator in January, Dennis had the perfect opportunity to introduce his collaborator to the collector community in Orange County, to begin their search for the appropriate works that are featured as part of "OC Collects."

#### **Creating a Thematic Mosaic**

Creating an exhibition is not as easy as it sounds. "The real meat and potatoes of the work is the research," Dan says. "I was inside the homes and having a substantive art driven conversation with the most important collectors in Orange County." For many months, Dennis and Dan visited the homes of some of the most prominent art collectors in Southern California, including

Anton D. Segerstrom and Mary and Dan Solomon. "It was only after we visited everybody and had the opportunity to digest and absorb what we had seen that we would really start thinking about the concept for the exhibition and how we would organize that," Dennis says. He notes that this "organic process" came from talking to people within the OC community who possess a deep love for art.

Dan points out that the theme of the exhibition really didn't come to fruition until they visited Gerald Buck, one of the most renowned collectors in Southern California. "The direction of the exhibition was unclear until Gerald Buck gave it its shape," he says. What helped, he continues, was Buck's passion for many artistic genres, spanning from the 1930s to the present. "OC Collects" also includes works by abstract expressionist Willem de Kooning, California-based artists George Herms and Richard Diebenkorn, and international talents such as Willie Doherty, Emily Jacir and Robin Rhode, who are making their debut in Orange County.

#### **Discovering Hidden Treasures**

Both curators agree that researching works of art for an exhibition does have some profound moments. One of their discoveries that will be included in the exhibition is an obscure painting by California modernist John McLaughlin. "It's a major work that apparently hasn't seen the light of day, one that I have never seen," Dan says. "I had one of those 'Oh my God' moments. That was exciting for me." Dennis' favorite includes a painting by Helen Frankenthaler (from the private collection of Joan and Don Beall), who died this past December. "[Her passing] makes the work all the more relevant and it reminds us what an important impact she had to the development of painting beginning in the 1950s and 1960s," he says.

While collecting these works, the one common factor both curators kept in mind was the mission of the exhibition: to help Southern California artists become internationally recognized and establish the area as a major cultural beacon for contemporary art in the world, as well as expanding the evolution of the art world from a western point-of-view to one that is multicultural. "That wasn't the case 40 years ago," Dennis says. He adds with a smile: "The art world is now a global phenomenon." NBM

BS: It's easy to get off track when you add too many different elements to table design, so just remember to keep things simple. I recommend a festive floral arrangement in the center, a coordinating table runner or cloth, and then add a touch of whimsy with a sprig of holly berries or a glass ornament attached to the napkin or party favor.

## decorating the traditional holiday tree?

**BS:** Collect ornaments from your travels or

special life moments. I love when a tree tells a story.

#### NBM: What else can be added to the home during the season to make it warm and full of holiday cheer?

BS: Add familiar holiday smells to your home by cooking wassail on the stove or lighting holiday-scented candles. Lighting a fire in the fireplace, even in the warm climate of Newport Beach, will always add to the magic of the holiday season, and don't forget to turn up the holiday tunes!

#### NBM: What is the biggest challenge of decorating your own home?

BS: Finding time to decorate right after Thanksgiving so that I have sufficient time to enjoy all of the work that goes into decorating for the holidays. Some years I get so busy that before I know it, it's Dec. 15, and I have NBM: What tips do you have for not done a thing! I get a little bummed out when I realize I only have 10 days to enjoy a festively decorated holiday home.

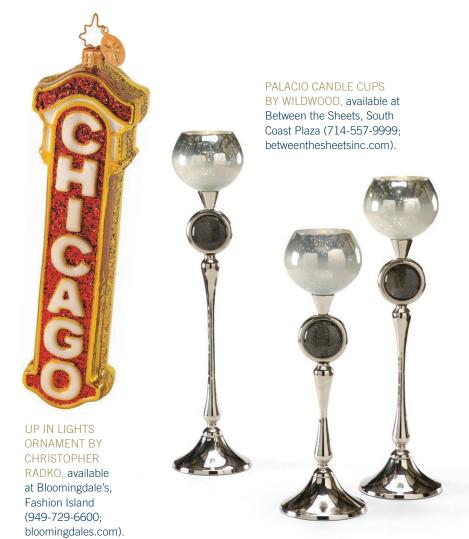

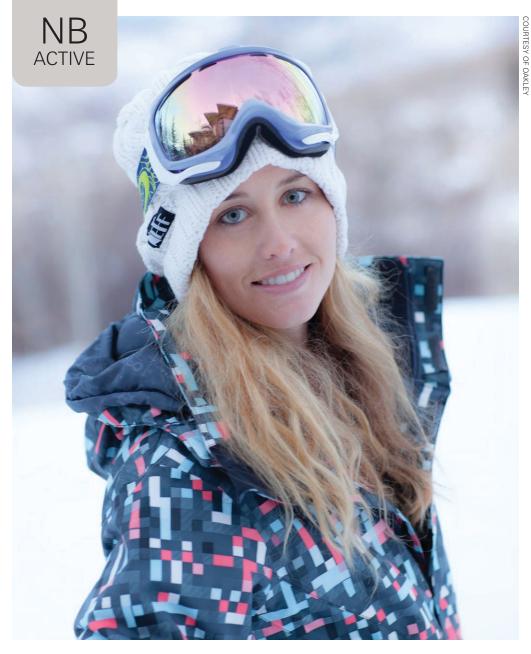

#### **SNOWBOARD STANDOUT**

Chanelle Sladics went from weekend warrior to professional snowboarder.

Newport native Chanelle Sladics didn't set out to be a professional snowboarder. As a teenager, after a fluke fall from a roof, the athlete spent years in intensive therapy, recovering from an injury that almost forced doctors to amputate her arm. Once she was strong enough to play sports again, there was something different: This time, she was ready to try snowboarding, figuring that with her now recovered body she would start badly at any sport—familiar or not. At the same time, a local snowboard shop offered a package: lessons, a

ride to the mountains and rental equipment. With recent birthday money in hand, Chanelle bought the package, and by the third day on the mountain the shop had sponsored her in a competition—in which she placed second.

"I didn't know where snowboarding was going to take me, but my parents supported me and brought me to the mountain every Sunday," she says. That first year, she won a wild card to the nationals; the second year, she performed even better, and by the third she was on the junior national team. As a last hurrah before sidelining the sport for college, Chanelle went to the junior world championships in New Zealand. But because of previous results, her expectations were low.

"I gave it everything and somehow managed to win the halfpipe competition," she says. "That created a shift in me—I thought, 'I live at the beach and I go snowboarding on Sundays, and I compete against people who live in the snow. I have some talent that I'm not totally tapping into."

Chanelle still left for college, but weeks in, MTV called and invited her to be part of a televised surf-skate-snow competition around the world with some of the biggest names in snowboarding—she went, and 10 years later, she is still professionally snowboarding.

#### NBM: Best mountains to ride in California?

**CS:** Mammoth, Squaw Valley and Big Bear—because it's Newport's backyard.

## NBM: Outside of California, where are your favorite places to ride?

**CS:** Breckenridge (Colo.) has the best snowboard park in the world.

#### NBM: Off the mountain, what do you do?

**CS:** My family still lives in Newport, and we just started a reusable drinking straw company called Simply Straws. I do all the branding, outreach and art direction.

## NBM: For new riders, what's the best way to start in the sport?

**CS:** Book a trip to Mammoth or Tahoe for the week and get a lesson the first day. It's really helpful to learn how to set up your stance and how to carve. Really take your time—and consider wrist guards.

## NBM: What about riders who want to advance skills?

**CS:** If you're a woman, my favorite program is Oakley's Progression Sessions—you snowboard all day for two days with other women and professional women snowboarders, and you just get immersed in the environment.

## NBM: What's the best way to keep in shape for the sport?

**CS:** Cross training is really important, and yoga has changed my life—I'm a certified teacher through YogaWorks.

#### NBM: What's next for the sport?

**CS:** They just added my discipline, Snowboard Slopestyle, in the 2014 Olympics. In Slopestyle, the goal is to perform the most difficult tricks while getting the highest amplitude off of jumps.

This year's most influential people, nominated by you, range from park preservers and conservationists to generous yet vigorously active advocates for the arts, technology, the city's fiscal foundation and the physical well being of its residents.

### HENRY AND ELIZABETH SEGERSTROM

BEST KNOWN FOR: Business visionary and founding chairman of Segerstrom Center for the Arts, Henry Segerstrom is also managing partner of CJ Segerstrom & Sons Real Estate Development and Operation Firm. He opened South Coast Plaza in 1967, which was recently recognized as the first planned retail center in the world to reach \$1.5 billion in sales. Henry notes that a Dior representative has called it, "the finest retail center in the world." Through his own land, generous gifts from family and private fundraising, Henry built Segerstrom Hall, the South Coast Repertory Theater and the Renee and Henry Segerstrom Concert Hall. Former national chairman of the Business Committee for the Arts, Henry received the Carnegie Hall Medal of Excellence in 2010 following the launch of the Segerstrom Center for the Arts bi-coastal partnership with Carnegie Hall. Most recently, The Dizzy Feet Foundation recognized his lifelong commitment to bringing the best of dance to Segerstrom Center for the Arts. Elizabeth Segerstrom, Henry's wife and business and cultural partner for more than 12 years, helped to direct the opening of the Renee and Henry Segerstrom Concert Hall. A doctor of psychology, she oversees much of their charitable work benefitting the arts and education in Orange County.

LITTLE-KNOWN FACTS: Henry was knighted by the king and queen of Sweden when the royals visited South Coast Plaza. "And we haven't spent a day apart in 13 years," Elizabeth says.

WHAT THEY'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN THEIR FIELD: Complete the new Orange County Museum of Art as part of the Segerstrom Center for the Arts.

### **GEORGE ARGYROS**

BEST KNOWN FOR: As former chairman of the board of trustees at Chapman University for 26 years, George remains on the board where the business school bears his name. In 2011, George led the university's Young Alumni Giving Challenge, matching program donations dollar for dollar up to \$50,000—just a year after donating \$5 million to UCI for the campus' new eye institute. From 2001 to 2004, George proudly served as U.S. Ambassador to Spain and Andorra. "It was for my country and during a vital time in history," he says.

LITTLE-KNOWN FACT: "I'm just a guy who enjoys working, enjoys people and enjoys life," George says. "And I feel we all have an obligation to give back if we can."

WHAT HE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN NEWPORT BEACH: Or rather, not change. "We've got a great place to live, so we need to keep it fresh, ready and aggressive in a positive way," he says. "I think, for the most part, the city does a good job with that."

WHAT HE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN HIS FIELD: "I'm a real estate developer primarily, and an investor. I don't know if I want anything to change," says George, the president of Arnel & Affiliates, a 40-year-old privately-owned development company. "But we need to make sure the economy is running properly and that Americans have opportunity."

FUTURE PLANS: Enjoy life, take care of his family and watch his grandkids grow up. "We've got a lot to enjoy and be grateful for," he says.



### ROBERT LYNN

BEST KNOWN FOR: A member of the 2000 Sydney Olympic team for water polo, Robert also served as an assistant coach in 2008 and 2012, becoming an integral part of winning a silver medal for the U.S. He coaches Newport Harbor High School's boys' water polo team and recently started the immensely successful Newport Beach Aquatics water polo and swim club, where he leads the club team, Newport Beach Water Polo. "My love for this sport drives me to dedicate myself to it in any way I can," he says. "I love developing athletes—not only as players, but as athletes of character and discipline, which spills over into their everyday lives."

LITTLE-KNOWN FACT: Robert lived overseas for 13 years in Italy, Greece, Croatia and France while playing professional water polo after his college career at USC. "I had a very enriching experience exchanging ideas with all kinds of people. I tried to bring the best of it home and share it with my high school and club athletes."

WHAT HE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN NEWPORT BEACH: The addition of another Olympic-class pool facility.

WHAT HE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN HIS FIELD: For water polo to get the recognition that it deserves, "because it is a truly beautiful game," Robert says.

FUTURE PLANS: Win a championship with Newport Harbor High School and build one of the best aquatics programs in the nation with Newport Beach Aquatics club. "I would also like to create a professional league in America to provide an outlet and the inspiration needed for our young athletes."

### **KEITH CURRY**

BEST KNOWN FOR: A council member since 2006. Keith has initiated efforts to reform the city charter. prevent the abuse of eminent domain and create a memorial to the U.S. Marines in Castaways Park. During his mayorship in 2010, he introduced the Fiscal Sustainability Plan. Newport now has "the highest level of financial reserves in the city's 106-year history, AAA bond ratings, and a strong and improving local economy," says Keith, the current mayor pro tem. Keith led efforts to construct the Newport Coast Community Center and renovate the OASIS Senior Center and is president of the Orange County Division of the League of California Cities.

LITTLE-KNOWN FACTS: A major Jimmy Buffett fan and avid reader of political histories, Keith is the decedent of legislators from Virginia, Georgia and Alabama.

WHAT HE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN NEWPORT BEACH: "Overcome partisan gridlock and work with local officials to forge consensus and get things done," says Keith, the founder of the Center for Public Policy at Concordia University. "The center is working to change our culture of conflict and bring people together."

FUTURE PLANS: In his role as chairman of the Orange County Parks Commission, Keith anticipates three new city parks: Newport Center Park, Sunset Ridge Park and Marina Park.





### RICHARD AFABLE, M.D.

BEST KNOWN FOR: President and CEO of Hoag Memorial Hospital Presbyterian, celebrating its 60th anniversary. In his seven years there, Richard, who is board certified in internal medicine, has led Hoag to the top 5 percent of hospitals nationwide for clinical quality and headed up a shift from being a hospital that takes care of the sick to one that focuses on health and well being. In 2011, readers of Modern Healthcare and Modern Physician voted Richard one of the 50 Most Influential Physician Executives.

LITTLE-KNOWN FACT: "After Hoag, health care and Newport Beach, my passion is music," Richard says. He played professionally and has seven guitars. His pride and joy is a spitting image of one he sold in 1975 when he was "forced to keep his guitar, or eat."

WHAT HE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN NEWPORT BEACH: "Let's not beat ourselves up because we have so many prominent people here," Richard says. "That can be a point of leadership and it has been. Let's celebrate who we are, not be embarrassed by it."

WHAT HE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN HIS FIELD: On behalf of the largest employer in Newport Beach, Richard wants Hoag to be an integral part of daily life. "We are a not-for-profit community-based organization that exists for and by the community," he says. "We'd like to change their point of view into one of advocacy and ownership."

FUTURE PLANS: Building partnerships with patients, residents and business leaders to make Newport Beach "the healthiest community in the U.S."

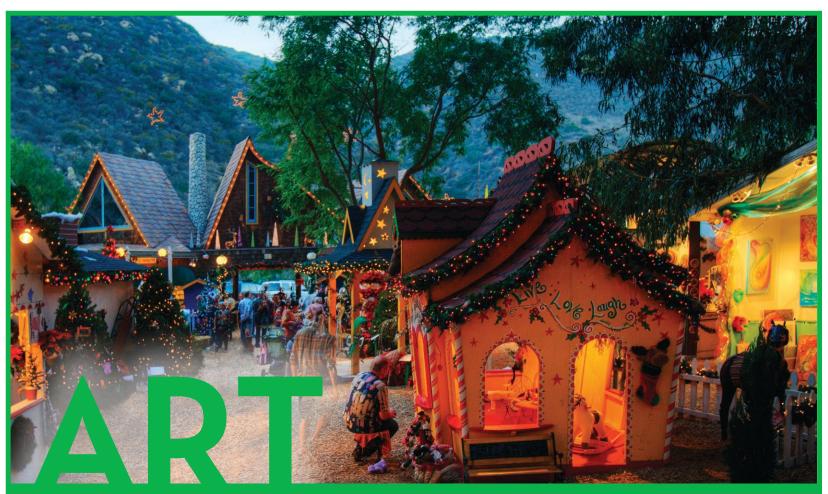


### DONALD BREN

BEST KNOWN FOR: As chairman of the Irvine Company, Donald was named one of Business Week's 50 most generous philanthropists in the nation in 2008 and topped Los Angeles Times' list of the 100 most influential people in Southern California in 2006. For more than 45 years, he has trail-blazed local real estate as a master planner, master builder and a long-term investor. On the board of trustees at Caltech, UC Irvine Foundation and the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, he has also contributed more to endowed chairs than any other single donor in the University of California's history. A lauded conservationist, Donald has donated 50,000-plus acres of Orange County land for parks, greenways, recreation and wilderness preserves.

LITTLE-KNOWN FACTS: He fondly remembers childhood weekends rowing in Newport Harbor. Donald attended the University of Washington on an athletic scholarship for downhill skiing. A broken ankle ended his hopes to make the 1956 Olympic ski team. These days he skis near the family's Sun Valley, Idaho, ranch.

POSSIBLE FUTURE PLANS: In a 2011 LA Times article, Rick Caruso, an Irvine Company board member, said, "In terms of great visionaries who have influenced Southern California, I'd put him up there with Walt Disney." As Irvine Company's sole shareholder, the 80-year-old has reportedly made plans for it to continue as a private company controlled by its board of directors.

### LAURA DAVICK

BEST KNOWN FOR: Founding the nonprofit that rescued Crystal Cove from developers and transformed it into a historic district based on restoration, conservation and education. Laura single-handedly spearheaded efforts that derailed the luxury resort at Crystal Cove, one of her "most passionate moments." Crystal Cove's educational programs now impact 35,000 students, grades K - 12, annually. As president and founder of Crystal Cove Alliance, Laura asserts the rental cottages and Beachcomber cafe are only the tip of an iceberg that includes 6.2 miles of coastline, 2,400 acres of backcountry and 1,100 acres of underwater park.

LITTLE-KNOWN FACTS: Before adopting this all-encompassing endeavor, Laura was involved in real estate development. Tirelessly orchestrating a bright future for the cove, where her parents owned a cottage in the 1940s, she now wants to cultivate her personal life to incorporate more travel, more boating and less work. "Believe it or not, I do enjoy escaping occasionally from Crystal Cove to recharge," she laughs.

WHAT SHE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN NEWPORT BEACH: Naturally, that the community becomes more engaged and actively involved at Crystal Cove. "The cove's legacy is an enormous undertaking, and we can't do it alone," Laura says. "This project takes the entire village, not just a few people."

WHAT SHE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN HER FIELD: That all nonprofits find a way to create a sustainable future for their missions.

FUTURE PLANS: With 29 cottages completely restored, her goal is the challenging task of restoring the final 17 cottages, a \$20-million pursuit.

### JANET AND JAMES 'WALKIE' RAY

BEST KNOWN FOR: Since their involvement in founding the Discovery Science Center, the Rays have become benefactors for Orange County School of the Arts, MIND Research Institute and MacGillivray Freeman Films Educational Foundation, among others. Janet is also vice chair of Arts Orange County and on the board of Pacific Symphony Youth Ensemble. Both are advocates of the Orange County Great Park, where Walkie is on the board of directors.

LITTLE-KNOWN FACT: The lifelong lovebirds met in Corona del Mar at the bus stop in third grade, yet attended local rival high schools before graduating from Stanford University.

WHAT THEY'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN NEWPORT BEACH: The renewal of the Peninsula, where they live. "The other end of Newport is receiving all kinds of attention with the new City Hall," Walkie says.

FUTURE PLANS: Construction projects including the Balboa Theater and the next phase of the Discovery Science Center, the most visited science center per square foot in the U.S. "It used to be a place for elementary kids, but with the 'Star Wars' exhibit last year and 'Indiana Jones' this year, it is growing up, and people of all ages are attending," Walkie says.

BEST KNOWN FOR: Helping to establish and develop the Performing Arts & Multimedia Academy (PAMA) at Corona del Mar High School, then spending countless hours to keep it vital, active and interesting. An English teacher for 11 years and a former department chair, Samantha led the program for five years, as it grew from a few students to more than 115. The "small learning community" has boosted participants' GPAs and in 2010, PAMA won a national competition from Hurley called Walk the Walk at the U.S. Open of Surfing, taking home the \$25,000 grand prize for its runway show that combined fashion, art, music and dance. In 2011, Samantha also implemented an anti-cyber bullying program among eighth graders.

LITTLE-KNOWN FACT: She struggled in high school. "That's why I can relate to the kids and help them overcome obstacles," Samantha says. "I have always been bright, but I cut corners and veered toward the rebellious side. The hard lessons I learned shaped who I am and made me a better person."

WHAT SHE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN NEWPORT BEACH: People work collaboratively and embrace their differences.

WHAT SHE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN HER FIELD: Smaller class sizes, more focus on the arts in education and a cessation to cutbacks and layoffs. "We are losing young and motivated teachers before they earn tenure," Samantha explains.

FUTURE PLANS: With her newly earned master's degree in administration at Pepperdine University, she dreams of becoming a principal or starting her own school.

### MARŞHALL 'DUFFY' DUFFIELD

BEST KNOWN FOR: Innovating the Duffy electric boat since he converted his family's 20-foot gas boat to electric in 1968. Our harbor holds 2.400 of his watercraft: more than 10,000 are found across the globe. Known for saving the city hundreds of thousands of dollars with the Mooring Master Plan Subcommittee, he was a Newport Beach Harbor commissioner until 2012. "We tried to better the harbor and make it more user-friendly for visiting yachts and locals," he says.

LITTLE-KNOWN FACT: "I've raced on the best boats in the world and have applied that to the boats I make, designed to maximize both horsepower and stability," Duffy says.

WHAT HE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN NEWPORT BEACH: City enforcement of the Harbor Area Management Plan to support marinerelated and commercial waterfront operations instead of increased residential sprawl. "The character of the harbor is in jeopardy," Duffy says.

WHAT HE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN HIS FIFLD: More American-built boats and materials made in the U.S.

FUTURE PLANS: Finish developing a harbor patrol/fire boat that runs on batteries but uses its engine in emergencies. "The technology is here, and I want to apply it ... to reduce the noise, pollution and damage typical patrol boats cause," he says. NBM

Element has evolved along with skate culture, adding a full women's line, environmentally responsible clothing and the Elemental Awareness Foundation, an in-house nonprofit that educates and inspires young people through skateboard events, wilderness workshops and more. Even more than Element and outreach, Johnny values his relationships with his wife, Kori, and their children, which inspires him in all he does, from art to entrepreneurship. "At Element, I love our international amateur contest series finals, where skaters from around the world come together to experience nature and to compete at Element YMCA Skate Camp," he says. "And although it's not my own accomplishment, I'm very proud of Kori's accolades as a tennis champion and her entrepreneurial adventure as a tea brewer."

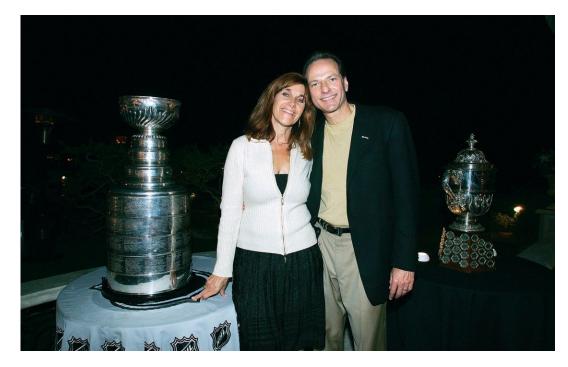


### MOHAMED EL-ERIAN

Broadcom's role is to connect people to everything and everyone that matters."

### DON **SCHOENDORFER**

BEST KNOWN FOR: Founding the nonprofit Free Wheelchair Mission, which bestows the gift of mobility through sturdy, rugged wheelchairs for impoverished individuals in developing nations. Every \$71.88 turns into a wheelchair for someone in desperate need. Don created the organization in 2001, about two decades after he and his wife Laurie were vacationing in Morocco and saw a disabled woman struggling to drag herself across a dirt road. Since then, fellow Americans have partnered with his organization to give 660,000 wheelchairs to the disabled in developing countries.

LITTLE-KNOWN FACT: Don is selfdescribed as a "humble engineer trying to serve God's kingdom." He also adds: "And I love to get my hands dirty."

WHAT HE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN NEWPORT BEACH: He'd love to see Newport Beach adopt a poor community in a developing country.

WHAT HE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN HIS FIELD: He hopes to see more engineers sharing their talents with those in need.

FUTURE PLANS: "There are more than 100 million people with mobility disabilities living without a wheelchair, who cannot afford to buy one," Don says. "My goal is to get them wheelchairs and help them know that they are loved by God." More shortterm, he'd like to gift 1 million chairs by 2015.





### CHRIS WELSH

BEST KNOWN FOR: Co-founder/pilot, along with Sir Richard Branson, of Virgin Oceanic. Their team will explore the deepest part of each ocean via a one-person submarine on the upcoming Five Dives Expedition. An adventurer and entrepreneur, Chris has swum with great white sharks, traversed the country on a dirt bike and has flown his twin-engine plane and his helicopter across the continental U.S.—all while logging 25,000 miles of competitive sailing.

LITTLE-KNOWN FACT: "I work!" he insists. Chris also maintains his longstanding career in real estate investment. "I am a product of Newport and public schools from Mariners Elementary to Harbor High and UC Berkeley, and I give credit to school and my parents," he says.

WHAT HE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN NEWPORT BEACH: A return to the original cooperative, get-it-done approach on bay issues, starting with completing the Bay Club to Lido Village boardwalk.

WHAT HE'D LIKE TO SEE CHANGE IN HIS FIELD: Cooperation to standardize the necessary hardware for deep-sea exploration, so that massive exploration becomes routine not extraordinary.

FUTURE PLANS: Inspiring "gumption" in kids. "For every thousand couch drivers with Nintendo machines, we need a few Indiana Joneses," Chris says. "Diving deep and sharing what we find via documentaries is the immediate goal, but translating that into inspiration is the underlying push." NBM

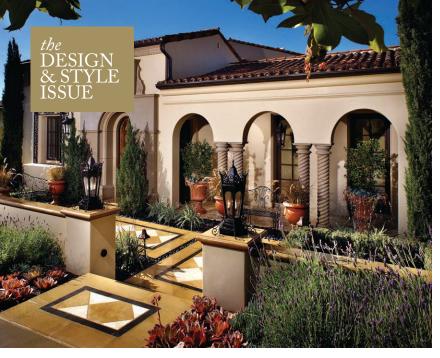

### Quintessentially Newport

FIVE LOCAL DESIGNERS REFLECT THE CITY'S CASUAL SOPHISTICATION IN THEIR STUNNING INDOOR AND OUTDOOR SPACES.

Newport Beach boasts an interesting and eclectic mix of architecture and home design styles within its multiple neighborhoods. Here, five local interior and architectural designers highlight rooms they have designed in the city and explain what makes these particular spaces so quintessentially Newport.



ELEGANT OUTDOOR LIVING

MARK SCOTT,
MARK SCOTT ASSOCIATES

"I like to tell my clients, 'You give me the ingredients, and I'll bake the cake,' " says landscape architect Mark Scott of Mark Scott Associates in Newport Beach. "I listen to what they say and then interpret it." For the Santa

Barbara-style Crystal Cove summer home of his clients, a Texas-based couple. Mark was challenged with creating a backyard outdoor space with different entertaining areas that incorporated the wife's desire for more formality and the husband's for something more "random and natural." The result was a terraced space that perfectly blends casual and formal aesthetics, and features several spots for entertaining and quiet relaxation. On the upper terrace is a covered pavilion, which encompasses a complete outdoor kitchen, bar and fireplace and is bounded by formal clipped hedges. A few steps down is the lowered pool terrace, which required the extensive removal of soil to create, Mark notes. It channels a tropical lagoon vibe with its palm trees-King palms were chosen for their narrower trunks that help maximize the view—lush plantings and a natural stone waterfall. Opposite the pavilion is an approximately 20-foot-by-30-foot synthetic turf lawn "that is like a green fuzzy patio," Mark says, adding that the couple can have functions there or just relax. "They have a good-sized movable day bed and chaises they bring out there," he says. "It is a very pleasant spot—you can see Irvine Cove."

A loggia off the house affords views up and down the coast and features a fire pit. Entering the house from the front, an inviting step-down courtyard with a fireplace brings more formality to the space. "It is a very pleasant place," Mark says. "When it is windy out, the courtyard is a nice place. ... You can entertain in that whole space very nicely."

And what makes this stunning entertainment space quintessential Newport? "I've given talks to the American Society of Outdoor Architects Landscape Architects about outdoor living rooms and kitchens and outdoor rooms," Mark says. "It is a typical [desire] now for every Newport Beach person—some variation of an outdoor [room]."

### COUNTRY FRENCH BATHROOM

SHALA SHAMARDI, HAUTE DESIGN STUDIO

"In Newport Beach, you find all different styles and eras of home design," says Shala Shamardi, Haute Design Studio principal designer. "The difference is that Newport Beach clients have a very cultivated taste. As long as I can incorporate this upscale taste with practicality and comfort it makes the design quintessential to Newport Beach."

For her Corona del Mar clients, Shala designed a French country master bathroom that is both upscale and relaxed. True to the comfortable design style, the bathroom effortlessly mixes easy sophistication with Old World charm. It took two months to complete, from demolition of the original bathroom to placing the towels and accessories on the new cabinet shelves.

"The previous bathroom was dated and impractical," she says. "My clients wanted a bathroom in French country style that maximized the space. To achieve this goal, we rebuilt the new bathroom to include a lot of storage and plenty of style and practicality."

Her clients desired a black-and-white color

palette, which Shala explains are predominant colors in French country decorating. She incorporated soft green walls and various materials to create a one-of-a-kind design that is interesting and current. The Carrera marble shower enclosure and bathtub deck contrast elegantly with the dark granite bathroom countertop. The floor is made of natural stone.

"I designed a medallion for the shower enclosure to complement the tasteful sink and tub backsplash," she says. "The birch cabinets were custom-designed and are stained in a cool green with black overtones."

The color palette continues into the printed window treatments, which provide both privacy and European elegance. French wall prints and whimsical crystal lighting fixtures bring a feeling of big-city Parisian chic to the French-country-inspired space. Shala notes that black and white in decorating can often look very harsh. "This space is soft and light and looks very French," she says. "The use of soft greens and the lighting and accessories adds to that."

### CHIC COASTAL-LIVING

OHARA DAVIES-GAETANO, BLISS DESIGN

Located near The Wedge, the coastal weekend retreat of Ohara Davies-Gaetano's clients takes its inspiration from its waterside surroundings. Ohara, the principal designer for Bliss Design, set out to create "a chic, sophisticated beach house" that was also approachable and comfortable.

"The rooms, including the living room, are not huge, so I wanted to make sure the furniture didn't overwhelm the space," she explains. "I focused the palette in neutral colors to make the living room feel larger and went practical when selecting fabrics, including using a lot of natural linens." For some of the key pieces of furniture, Ohara used slipcovers for easy cleaning.

She calls the living room "European-inspired meets Newport Beach" for its mix of styles and pieces. The Karen Robertson sea fan and seashell art piece over the sofa bring the ocean and its creatures inside, mirroring the vast ocean outside.

"I wanted something visually stimulating on the wall but not too colorful," Ohara says. "By incorporating the piece it allows for texture on the wall and a beautiful focal point."

The gray upholstered chairs by the fireplace, with their antique European style, would be perfectly at home in an elegant mountain chalet. In the home by The Wedge, the chairs juxtapose perfectly with the relaxed beach feel and seem

to say, "Come in and enjoy the sunshine and read a book," says Ohara, noting that they are her favorite pieces in the room.

A hand-loomed, vegetable-dyed area rug that Ohara had custom-made in Tibet anchors the living room's main seating space, which includes an oversized cocktail ottoman that allows you to put your legs up or have additional seating when entertaining, she says.

Indeed, no details have been overlooked in the room, which even features a custom-made Tempur-Pedic dog bed that blends perfectly into the decor and ensures that the owners' dog, Felicity, will also enjoy relaxing weekends at the beach.





### ECLECTIC MODERN MASTER

MELISSA PALAZZO, PAL + SMITH

New and old blend, and bright color pops against soothing white in the 400-square-foot master bedroom suite of Melissa Palazzo's two-story home near the Back Bay. The principal designer and creative director at Costa Mesabased Pal + Smith designed her entire home, following a complete remodel of the original 1950s-era house on the property, to incorporate her "eclectic modern" style. The result was a Newport Beach home and master bedroom that are both fashionable and comfortable.

"I think of Newport as being pretty casual," she says. "This master is a great casual yet stylish space."

Wanting a space that was soothing, Melissa incorporated white sheers behind the bed and at the slider, which kept the room very soft and allowed her to introduce pieces that were a little heavier, like the Edge Bed from Environment Furniture. "It is a modern-looking bed but very functional," Melissa explains. "You can put bedding in all the drawers and sit all the way around it on the extra-wide ledge."

White pendant lights from Wohlert float over the space on either side of the bed for more airiness. A Rick Meoli white-framed horse photograph hanging above the bed is a dramatic focal point in the room.

"I grew up riding in Northern California," Melissa says. "I always think horses are peaceful, so it went with having a peaceful master bedroom. It is a very ethereal piece."

Her signature "color pop" is evidenced in the bright, geometric-patterned rug, the colorful retro telephone and rich green plants, all of which draw the eye while blending effortlessly into the whole. Also melding into the design is the Italian carved-wood chair from the 1830s, the only antique in the room.

"I love antiques, so every space in my home must have one signature piece," she says. "The chair is one of my favorite pieces."









### BEACH-STYLE KITCHEN & NOOK

DAWN ROSENMAYR, ROSENMAYR INTERIORS

"My client was completing the construction of his new home and wanted it to be comfortable for a couple," says Dawn Rosenmayr, principal of Rosenmayr Interiors. "He wanted an equal balance of masculine and feminine touches, but most importantly, he wanted the home to be warm and cozy. He was single at the time of the design but is now married."

Dawn achieved the goals of her client throughout the Newport Coast home's interior. In the kitchen and kitchen nook she balanced the hard lines and dark colors built into the 4,000-square-foot home's Tuscan architecture by using light and airy fabrics like linens and cottons on the furniture and window

treatments. She had a down sofa custommade for the eat-in kitchen nook. The blue fabric on the sofa coordinates with the nook's window coverings.

"I loved the idea of two people eating there in the nook together comfortably," Dawn says. "The sofa is all down and comfortable and cozy so they can just melt into it. It is their favorite place to eat and fits them both perfectly," she says about the homeowners.

The nook's custom-made oval table is built of rustic walnut planks. It was designed to swivel in the small space to make it easier to walk around. The chairs, which feature upholstered seats, add another touch of softness to the

space. By the kitchen island, McGuire barstools provide casual seating.

The kitchen, nook and family room were designed as one large open space. The family room features custom-made oversized sofas and other pieces covered in linens and cottons. The stone coffee table is inlaid with shells for maximum beach ambience. Large glass doors from the room open up to let the outside in.

"To me, quintessential Newport style is a blend of traditional and coastal looks," Dawn says. "I wanted everything to be open and seethrough and when the wind came in through the doors it would feel airy and breezy." NBM

WHEN IT COMES TO FASHION, SOME MAY imagine that Orange County takes the backseat to its northern neighbor, Los Angeles—home to the iconic Rodeo Drive and celebrity studded boutiques. Locals, however, won't be surprised to find that men and women of all ages enjoy a selection of unique shopping opportunities right in our own backyard—with some great ocean breezes to boot.

Newport Beach's burgeoning shopping scene made its first major strides nearly 50 years ago when South Coast Plaza opened its doors in nearby Costa Mesa in March 1967, followed shortly thereafter by Fashion Island in September. In the years since, the two centers have grown into retail meccas, offering up some of fashion's biggest names.

Although local malls are lauded for their upscale collections of designer stores, even more noteworthy are the shops offering locals and visitors an opportunity to browse the racks for hard-to-find items. Our coastal town is home to a number of stores exclusive to the West Coast or Southern California—meaning that even a drive up to LA won't yield the prized merchandise style-seekers can find at one of Newport's charming boutiques or shopping centers.

#### **FASHIONABLE ISLAND**

Located just a stone's throw from the Pacific Ocean, Fashion Island is a favorite of retailers from a different coast.

"Newport Beach has a sophisticated shopper who is well-traveled and appreciates unique stores and new concepts," says Dan Sheridan, president of Irvine Company Retail Properties, which owns Fashion Island.

In summer 2012, J. Christopher Burch's lifestyle brand C. Wonder debuted at Fashion Island, bringing its whimsical prints and vibrant colors to Newport in this West Coast exclusive store.

"This was a really important market to us," says Amy Shecter, president of C. Wonder. "The [Newport Beach] customer understands aesthetic, color and luxury."

Customization is the key to luxury at C. Wonder, with the store offering monogramming, embroidery and engraving for nearly all of its products. In addition to women's apparel, accessories and home decor, the store also provides a few fun surprises that include personalized products for dogs, pogo sticks and an array of unique tech accessories.

"We don't take ourselves too seriously," Amy adds. (cwonder.com)

On the north end of the center, Vineyard Vines







offers nautically inspired styles at its only West Coast location. Launched by its neckties emblazoned with icons of "the good life"—such as fishing and boating—the brand has expanded to offer clothing and accessories for men, women and children.

"The Vineyard Vines brand really lends itself to life on the coast—East or West," says Lindsey Worster, vice president of brand communications. (vineyardvines.com)

The coasts continue to collide at another new Fashion Island shop, Joie. Newport is a natural extension for the Southern California-inspired brand—although its flagship boutique is in New York City and its only other retail space is in Paris.

"It seemed natural that our first West Coast

boutique would be by the beach," says Serge Azria, CEO and creative director of Joie. "Orange County serves as the perfect backdrop for the collection, which is constantly inspired by Southern California and its casual yet sophisticated way of life."

Serge adds that for the upcoming year, the brand hopes to bring potential jewelry and accessory collaborations with local designers to its collections of apparel, handbags and shoes. (joie.com)

Another company inspired by coast-to-coast travels is Ella Moss, which offers local women and girls an exclusive retail location—the only one of its kind—for feminine and flirty fashion.

"The Newport Beach customer exemplifies the Ella Moss girl. She loves sunny days and the beach

and knows how to dress up a T-shirt and dress down a dress," says creative director Pamella Protzel-Scott.

"More than ever, shoppers are incredibly smart and up-to-date on top-tier designers and brands, but they also seek special, hard-to-find items that aren't readily available everywhere," says Debra Gunn Downing, South Coast Plaza's executive director of marketing. "For example, a brand such as Roger Vivier, which opened its first and only West Coast flagship this year at South Coast Plaza, had a tremendous response."

Credited as the inventor of the stiletto, Roger Vivier's legacy lives on at South Coast Plaza. The designer's namesake boutique brought vintage yet modern Parisian flair to OC earlier this year with its signature heels and handbags.

"All of our boutiques around the world are inspired by the interiors of Monsieur Roger Vivier's very own Parisian apartment—[this] new boutique is no exception," says Sabine Brunner, the brand's general manager.

# Street Style SEE HOW THE LATEST TRENDS TRANSLATE FROM

In the way of Fashion trends, fall 2012 is going big (as you'll recall from Vogue's 1,000-page September issue—the largest in the publication's 120-year history). So big, in fact, that it seems hard to go sartorially wrong when such a diverse range of styles are "en vogue." Couture-clad models marched the Fashion Week runways showcasing everything from military-detailed duds and rock star heavy metals to soft winter whites and opulent brocades. Thread in leather and lace applique, fur (faux, of course!), bold graphic prints and a slew of textures, hues and silhouettes, and the possibilities still aren't close to covered.

Of course, how these trends translate from the New York, Paris, London and Milan catwalks to SoCal's coast is vastly different from what we'd see, say, in Manhattan, Boston or even San Francisco. Not only does our year-round balmy weather relieve us of the need for wool trench coats and ear muffs, but the relaxed, easy and carefree vibe that comes with living in a beach town also finds expression through our wardrobes.

Newport Beach Magazine consulted with the town's top stylists for a trend report and insider tips, and then took to the neighborhood streets—a la The New York Times' famous style photographer Bill Cunningham, save the bicycle and worn windbreaker—to capture how Southern Californians are putting their own spin on the top trends.





#### **Modern Classics**

"You can never go wrong with classic pieces," advises Leslie Christen, stylist to Newport's elite, and personal shopper at The St. Regis Monarch Beach. Chicly outfitted in cuffed skinny jeans, a plain white T-shirt and fitted military jacket, a camel leather Chloé bag over her arm, she adds, "Designer items are a good investment because you can wear them forever ... and cheaper 'classic' finds will still look more expensive."

The classics typically keep to neutral colors-navy blue, black, gray, browns and beiges, white—and are your go-to pieces that fit comfortably and make you feel confident. Think denim, soft cotton T-shirts and buttondowns, cashmere sweaters, and tailored coats

for both men and women. Your most elegant little black dress, precious family jewels and most wearable pair of Louboutin pumps also fall into this category.

A few in-season items to add to your foreverstaples, Leslie says, that are sure to be seen in Newport Beach are winter whites (a summer favorite in more textured fabrics), cropped coats, capes and peplum hems (which will weave in and out of style over the years), highwaisted and loose-fitting trousers (paired with a structured shirt) and leather equestrian boots. Accessorize with driving caps and fedoras, scarves and timeless jewelry. "I just bought a chunky gold cuff necklace," she reveals. "Jewelry is a great way to change your look and dress up





more [simplistic] clothes."

The stylish men of Newport seem to be adopting a more preppy New England style as of late, donning casually-worn Oxford shirts, straight (not skinny) denim and Topsiders, all of which can be updated this fall and winter. For dressier occasions, Leslie says, skinny tailored suits are on-trend. "Classic three-piece suits with a narrow silhouette—those are great."

Returning to the autumn It list for yet another season, military-inspired styles for both sexes have also become a classic that's always in fashion. "I love the military trend for both men and women," says OC-based fashion designer Lisa Rodarte. "Military styling and details are classic and easy to wear. I love military-inspired parkas, bags and boots." Dare to think outside the barracks and also try on feminine military detailing like cargo pockets, brass buttons, buckles and patriotic patchwork adorning everything from skirts to ballet flats.

#### Right on Hue

While earth tones never fade out of style, a few colors boldly stand out this season: Bordeaux, orange, gold and a mix of heavy metals dominated the Fashion Week designers' shows, and will likely be at the forefront of Newport fashion this fall.

We saw both leather and wine hues make their debut, and the two also poured together on everything from riding pants and quilted vests

to pencil skirts and peplum belts. From frocks to stockings, gold also glittered on the runway, along with sparkly midnight shades that can be rocked day or night, depending on how you pair them (opt for subtlety in the early hours—woven into a knit, for instance, and save more brilliant pieces for evening).

Colorful prints popped up in a variety of fashions, from retro 1970s geometric patterns to silver- and gold-threaded brocade (and even faux brocade—patterns printed on other materials like silk). "My favorite trend for fall 2012 is the printed trouser," says Lisa. "I think it's a great new way to bring back [this pant style] and I love all the different fits I'm seeing—flare, pencil, cropped and wide leg."

If you thought bold bedazzling went out of fashion in the 1990s, never to make a comeback, think again: Everything from embellished scoop necklines to cigarette pants to chunky platforms

is making a statement this season (much more elegant than the bejeweled stonewashed denim from decades ago).

Also kicked up a notch this season is the return of the motorcycle ("moto") boot and bootie. Beyond basic black, step into a variety of shades and textures—beiges, browns, reds—adorned with buckles, studs and other updated accents. "The bootie is the No. 1 shoe and must-have this season," Leslie says. "My favorite are moto boots by Rag & Bone."

When it comes to color, a rich and diverse palette invites you to explore and experiment with your wardrobe this fall.

#### Mix It Up

"Newport is more fashion-forward, so I think a lot of the season's trends will translate well here," says Leslie, who predicts what she calls "a mix of elements"—trends layered with beach-wear.











"We'll always have the beach vibe (and weather) here, so summer styles translate well into fall. We'll see items from last season worn with what's happening now. For example, a long floral dress roughened up with a motorcycle jacket and moto boots (she recommends Westerly Boutique and Bardot for stellar selections of styles). What we won't see in Newport is full structure or straightfrom-the-runway [ensembles]."

Lisa adds: "I like the fact that people in Newport don't take fashion too seriously and always incorporate an easygoing beach aesthetic to their wardrobe. What I love most is that mix of casual and trendy." Beyond the beach-y, Bohemian look, she thinks trends like the wide printed trouser will translate easily to casual Newport style, by pairing them with, say, a white T-shirt and flip-flops opposed to the tucked-in blouse and platforms that stomped the runways.

Newport-based stylist Channing O'Neill, who favors a bit of a Boho vibe and says she also loves mixing styles like floral prints with stripes, cautions not to go overboard: "Whatever trends you choose to mix, try not to overdo it," she says. "To keep it balanced, keep it natural and not 'done.' " Some of her favorite trends as of late are velvets, cable-knit sweaters, printed jeans, embellished sequined shorts (worn with a plain white T-shirt) and black booties.

"Although, the biggest excitement for me in the fall is finding a fun new handbag—that's always my main splurge." Channing is still searching for the perfect find.

For men, she's fond of mixing trendier pieces like fitted blazers with surf clothing, which, she acknowledges, most men in Newport will also incorporate into their style.

When it comes to fall fashion on the Newport streets, the rules are—there are no rules. "It's all about having fun with it," Lisa says. Keep in mind a few simple tips, Leslie advises, like dressing in what's most flattering on your figure and playing the proportions right—the smaller your size, the smaller the print; loose, flowing pieces on top or bottom but not both, go with something short or low-cut but not both, et cetera). So shop the local boutiques, try on a few fun trends and hit the streets. NBM







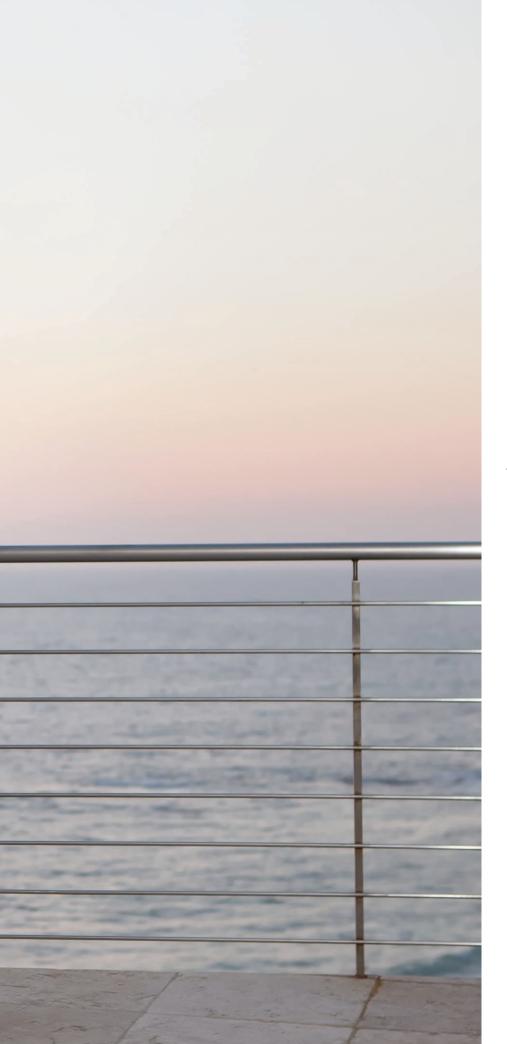

VAIL MOUNTAIN



Vail turns 50 this season, but with a temperament as youthful as ever, flaunting a high profile snowboard contest and a new Wi-Fi-enabled gondola for 2012-13. The sheer size of North America's largest ski resort, at 5,289 skiable acres, makes it hard to decide where to begin. A good starting place is the intermediate-toadvanced four-mile Riva Ridge-Vail's longest run-where snow is good throughout the day. Upper sections are steeper; lower sections are easier. For a healthy rush of adrenaline, Blue Sky Basin is a destination in itself and includes a run called Iron Mask. where one can launch off a cornice and finish valiantly with powdery turns for several beats. Because most of the lodging at Vail is at the upscale European base village, expect to feel surrounded by bliss every step of the way-including cuddling up under a fur blanket on the perimeter of an ice skating rink to rest up for tomorrow's ski day.



#### WHY VISIT NOW:

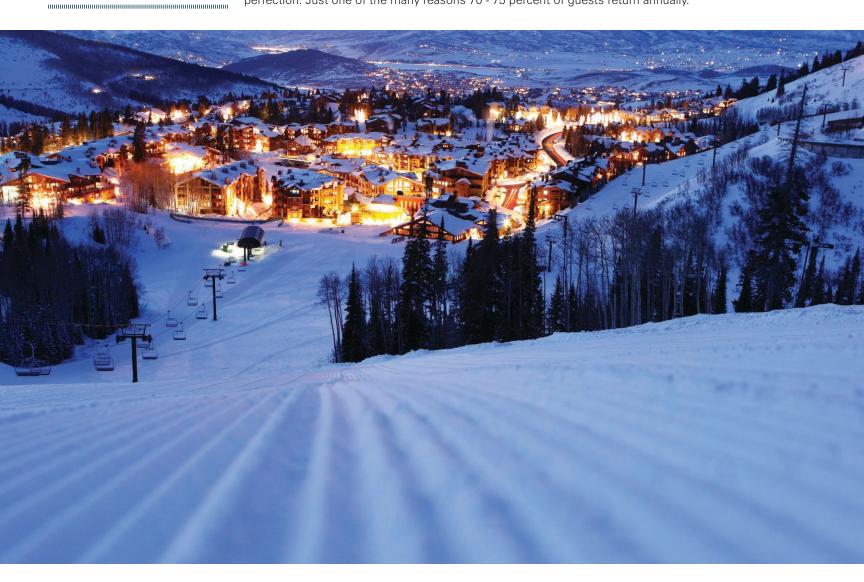

#### DEER VALLEY RESORT

No trip to ski-happy Park City, Utah, is complete without visiting the area's most opulent ski area, Deer Valley. The resort has invested an average of \$6 million per year over the past six years in on-mountain improvements, plus some of the finest new hotels in the ski industry. An exciting upgrade this season is a new quad chairlift accessing the Jordanelle area, with its signature Deer Valley run, an especially nice place to spend a morning as it softens in the sun. This intermediate trail offers skiers a melodic fall line, sending them soaring softly over bridges and alongside slope-side homes, and rolling them cleanly over groomed perfection. Just one of the many reasons 70 - 75 percent of guests return annually.



#### **CROSS-COUNTRY**

Slide up, over, down and across snowbound fields, aside frosted-over backcountry lakes and quiet nature trails that become insulated in silence after a storm. Cross-country skiing isn't just for fast-moving athletes with quads of steel. Many resorts offer complete morning-to-night experiences: Imagine waking up in a snowbound cabin on the backside of Mammoth Mountain with a mellow downhill cross-country trail out your front door (tamaracklodge.com). Pack a picnic and spend all day exploring the huge network of 90 trails that climb as high as 7,538 feet on Lake Tahoe's Donner Summit at North America's largest cross-country ski center, Royal Gorge—now operated by Sugar Bowl (royalgorge.com or sugarbowl.com). Head to Whistler Olympic Park for a lesson in classic cross-country skiing, the heart-pumping version known as skate skiing, or test your ability to "ski fast, shoot straight" at the center's Discover Biathlon program (whistlerolympicpark.com).

#### WHY VISIT NOW:

Pack your party beanie because the resort turns 40 on Dec. 22. Northstar opened 170 new acres of Lake Tahoe backcountry terrain last winter, an advanced zone of gladed tree skiing that can be accessed with a guide or via snowcat. Its ski school is now called the Adventure Guiding and Learning Center and can include everything from a gateaccessed day on the Sawtooth Ridge to a week in the Burton Snowboard Academy.

Local tip: Refuel with a brisket grilled cheese sandwich and wash it down with a spicy Beefy Mary (a bloody mary that comes with a slice of beef jerky) at Zephyr Lodge.

#### NORTHSTAR CALIFORNIA



Past the north shores of Lake Tahoe in a dense forested mountainside that was once a timber farm. Northstar holds the sorts of snowbound treasures that skiers and snowboarders dream up when they're far from snow: complex tree runs, deep stash powder turns and terrain parks with an infinity of varied obstacles and features. Pro snowboarder Shaun White co-designed the 22-foot halfpipe, which debuted in January 2012, and announced the resort as his primary training ground. "I pretty much have the opportunity to ride anywhere, and I chose to ride at Northstar California because it's all-time. The park's great and the pipe is always brand spankin' new," says the twotime Olympic gold medalist. Northstar has been Lake Tahoe's most ideal beginner and family resort for years because of gentle terrain in a nice spot under the gondola, and this year debuts a new Burton snowboard park targeted at 3- to 6-year-old mini-shredders.

#### **UP IN THE AIR**

For those who've always wanted to ski the out-of-bounds expanses of British Columbia's Selkirk Mountains, a new concept debuted last winter that accelerated the concept of heli-skiing: Bighorn at Revelstoke, an eight-room luxury chalet rental with its own helicopter pad in the backyard. After settling into the three-story timber framed lodge, a phone call will beckon one of Canada's premier tour operators to whisk you to the great snowy wide open of glaciers and pristine backcountry bowls that Canada is so well-known for (bighornrevelstoke.com). Have something closer in mind? Wasatch Powder Birds has been operating from a state-of-the-art heliport at Snowbird since 1973. Longevity is a good trait to trust when being dropped off on top of an unmarked, un-groomed, completely wild and free slope (powderbird.com).

#### SNOWBIRD/ALTA



It's nice to know you can travel to an expert-rated mountain without expecting a cold shoulder. Onthesnow.com readers voted the 'Bird "best overall resort" in 2012. "Customer service remains our No. 1 priority, and it seems to be working," says resort representative Emily Moench of Snowbird, where a serious 11,000-foot tram ride provides access to some of North America's steepest proving grounds, just 29 miles from Salt Lake City International Airport. "Our first day there, we stared at the giant map and an employee came over and asked if it was our first time there, our level of skiing and [told us], 'here is where you want to go in the morning versus the afternoon as the sun shifts positions.' He nailed it just right for us," says Rasa, a visitor from Novi, Mich. Don't miss Chip's Run—a scenery-rich top-to-bottom route that's suitable for beginner-to-intermediates who can link turns. Skiers can connect to Alta (snowboarders aren't permitted), where the 2012-13 season marks 75 years of schussing fine Wasatch powder in the Little Cottonwood Canyon.

#### ....... WHY VISIT NOW:

One of the only resorts to construct a new lift this year, Snowbird debuts the new Little Cloud high-speed quad lift.

Local tip: Alta is part of the new "Mountain Collective," a fourresort access pass for the price of \$349—with Aspen, Jackson Hole and Squaw Valley.

#### MAMMOTH MOUNTAIN

Many Southern Californians have memories of learning to ski and snowboard on Mammoth Mountain, but there may be no better time to be a kid than right now, with a new kids club, Woolly's Adventure Summit tubing park that opened in 2011. Also new this season: a progression park for learning snowboard tricks on small rails and jumps. "Not everybody who comes here is super pro, and we want to give them an area to build their skill set," says resort spokesperson Joani Lynch. But plenty of storm-chasers skip the park entirely and plan their visits the day after a legendary Sierra snow dump. "The gondola line always has a crazy excitement and energy level on a bluebird powder day," says professional snowboarder Kimmy Fasani. "Everyone's smiling and giving high fives. Powder turns just give you the best feeling. My first couple laps are on the Paranoids and then to the backside for a secret stash of powder."

#### WHY VISIT NOW:

.....

Mammoth Mountain beefs up its kids' tree zones this year: Narrow trails that zip and loop through snow-padded bumps and curves, spitting the pintsize skiers out onto a groomed trail, where, most likely, mom or dad is waiting. "They're fun little areas that kids have kind of self-developed, but now we go in and groom them," says resort spokeswoman Joani Lynch. "They're still kind of a secret, and kids like them as a secret. It's a place just for them where their parents don't necessarily want to go, and it's super fun for kids."

**Local tip:** The Night of Lights unifies visitors and locals who all gather to bundle up and watch fireworks light up the slopes for one brilliant (and brilliantly cold) night (Dec. 22).

#### WHY VISIT NOW:

If you haven't visited Whistler since the 2010 Olympics, prepare to be impressed by infrastructure that includes 220 of the world's most powerful snowmaking guns. New this season are guided backcountry skiing clinics led by professional coaches that launch right off the top of the ski area summit into the 480,000-acre Garibaldi Provincial Park.

Local tip: Fuel up with a cup of Thunderbird dark roast by organic Spirit Bear Coffee Company, available throughout the resort. Whistler started serving this eco fair trade Vancouver-based company—which supports bear habitat—late last season.

## WHISTLER BLACKCOMB

There are skiers who ski to feel like a kid again, and there are those who want to throw down on the world's greatest challenges. North America's definitive mega-resort has two side-by-side mountains where the best experiences are available no matter what you're seeking. The selection of terrain is so large that different zones can have their own microclimates. If it's a clear day, make it your mission to peak four times above 7,000 feet: Top of the World, Whistler Peak, top of Symphony, top of Harmony, top of 7th Heaven. When a storm rolls in and a huge dump of pow hits, local advice is well-guarded. "I'm keeping the details of my favorite runs to myself, but the Crystal Chair zone has a lot to offer. Hint, hint," professional snowboarder Braden Dean says. NBM

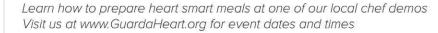

## **FAMILY TIES**

The Simpkins home on Onyx exemplifies the feelings residents have for the island. Kelley spent childhood summers here, a tradition that continued after she married. For years, James and Kelley Simpkins and their four children rented here with friends every August. Kelley had always dreamed of owning a home on the Island, though. "It's a great location," she says. "Onyx is one of the streets where the original families from Pasadena settled, and it's still so neighborly." This particular house had a special pedigree. The Buffum family (of Southern California department store fame) had built the house and still owned it. Kelley had always appreciated old homes, and this one

was filled with the Buffums' family history and artifacts-antiques, literature, bookcases filled with books on California history, sailing, Catalina Island and magic. She loved it.

Only one obstacle stood in the way: The living room was walled off from the kitchen and dining room. The wall was structural, requiring the installation of a steel beam to open up the rooms. Upstairs, Kelley found a wood-paneled den, which immediately suggested a "man cave" for her husband and four sons. Most of the old wooden floors were refurbished, and the kitchens and bathrooms updated—excepting one bath, which kept its original green and yellow painted tile work.

Kelley also retained the original balconies, which wrap around three sides of the house upstairs and provide a sense of openness to the bedrooms. Kelley was able to purchase several of the home's antiques, including an armoire, hutch, four-poster bed and side tables. A book dating to the 1800s, given to the Simpkins family by the Buffums, sits in a place of honor in the man cave. Kelley also saved the brass doorknocker, inscribed "Dick Buffum," as a reminder of the past. The Simpkins are thrilled with their updated "old" home. They enjoy it on weekends, holidays and during the summer. Someday, Kelley and James vow, it will become their retirement home.

## THROUGH THE GENERATIONS

GEOF WICKETT CANNOT REMEMBER A TIME when his home on Little Island's East Bayfront was not a part of his life. His grandfather bought the house in 1946 for Geof's parents, for about \$22,000. "Grandfather owned the house next door, and he put a door in the side of their house so there was access to my parents' carport. I remember the large parties they gave," Geof recalls. "Most of the parties included people from Fullerton Christian Church, [which] my great-grandfather started, and I remember the many hymns we sang before, during and after dinner." (Geof's great-grandfather was Charles Clark Chapman, the first mayor of Fullerton and a board member of California Christian College of Los Angeles. When the

college moved to the city of Orange, the name was eventually changed to Chapman University.)

Built in 1931 as a three-story Spanish pueblo, the home was remodeled in 1950 by Geof's father, an architect, who installed picture windows across the front of the house. Geof, who grew up in Fullerton, spent his summers there and visited during the winter. "I swam and sailed in the Flight of the Snowbirds," he says. "The Snowbird—it's a thing of the past now—was a great little sailboat." (Geof still gets out on the bay these days in his kayak.)

Geof's parents had lived in the house since 1970. After his mother's death in 2007, Geof moved in. He waited for more than a year before making any changes to the house he now shares

with roommates Norm Lessard and Brian Barber. "I have approximately 30 different roses on the carport roof," he says. "And through a pop hatch in the ceiling of the second story, you will come into my happy place—my rooftop garden—where I have pots of trees ... three avocado, two lemon, one orange, one apple, one peach and one nectarine. ... During the summer I grow tomatoes, pineapples, cucumbers and orchids." Geof also uses his produce in his cooking (he renovated the kitchen in 2009).

Continuing the tradition of hospitality, Geof hosts his three grown sons and friends for weekly brunches and dinners. "And we still sing hymns around the table, just as we did when I was growing up."

## DISCOVERING THE ISLAND

Don Abrams had lived in Newport Beach for several years when a friend invited him for walk on the island. "I fell in love with it and decided I should move here from Harbor View Homes," he says. Don took to running the island's three-mile bay front sidewalks, always looking for a likely house for sale. "This one," he says of the home he shares with his wife and son, "has 50 feet on the water (most lots are only 30 feet wide), and the canal was more affordable than the bay front."

Since purchasing the house in 1992, Don has made many renovations. "It's an upside down house," he explains (the living area is upstairs). He expanded the kitchen, reclaimed a dining room from a former small deck that had been made into

a bedroom and replaced the fireplace in the sitting area. The result is a great room that takes advantage of the water views. Just outside the dining room is a deck, which used to be Don's home office. Now a G-scale model railroad sits on its platform. Another O-scale model railroad sits in the living area, on a platform Don and Benjamin made last Father's Day. The railroad motif began with Thomas the Train when Benjamin was younger.

As Don worked on the house, its mysteries were revealed. "One day a lady knocked on the door. I found out that her mother had built the house as a single story, with the structure to someday add a second story. After seeing her old photos, I decided to return the north façade to its original curved

shape. It's a character house, and I've made the changes without interfering with that."

Don still likes to walk or run the island—and he can walk to his real estate office on Marine Avenue. He appreciates the friendly neighbors and the cool breeze that always blows through the canal. "We have a dock with a kayak and paddleboard," he says. "We play soccer on the sidewalk—if the ball goes in the water, it's time to get on our bathing suits and go get it."

"This is a true beach house," he concludes, "with real wood—no fake products. And it's still a work in progress. It suits me. Whenever I come down the hill and onto the bridge, I can see my house from there. It still feels so good." NBM

## **French Casual**

Brasserie Pascal at Fashion Island offers traditional French cuisine in a welcoming atmosphere.

ORANGE COUNTY'S OWN STAR FRENCH CHEF. Pascal Olhats, has been at the helm of several Newport Beach restaurants since the 1980s. While many loyal customers were sad to see Tradition by Pascal shutter its doors earlier this year, they will be happy to hear that some of those signature dishes are available on the Brasserie Pascal menu. Located in Fashion Island, Brasserie Pascal offers a taste of France, both in the traditional French cuisine and the brasserie atmosphere, which is warm and inviting, with shiny dark wood and black and red accents. What you won't find are tuxedo-clad waiters and white tablecloths: Brasserie Pascal is a friendly place, where you can have good food in a casual atmosphere with authentic French flavors, as Pascal himself describes it. "I like traditional," he notes. With Brasserie, he sought to maintain authenticity but in a non-intimidating atmosphere.

If you're dining at Brasserie for lunch, a

traditional French salad is a great place to start (or have as a meal). The Salade Maison features frisee and butter lettuce, poached egg and warm lardons served tableside with house vinaigrette. Or, opt for the duo of beets salad with lemon-flavored goat cheese, roasted hazelnuts and sherry vinaigrette. The mussels are also not-to-be-missed, prepared simply (and deliciously). Try the sauvignon blanc mussels made with white wine, leeks and herbs. Whatever you do, if you're a lover of meringues, make sure to order the Ile Flottante—light and absolutely mouth-watering, this meringue is house-made and cooked in milk.

On the dinner menu, you'll find tasty house specialties from the Tradition by Pascal menu, such as thyme-crusted sea bass, braised rabbit and rack of lamb, as well as a full Brasserie dinner menu. Pascal's special roasted bone marrow is from a family recipe, featuring beef marrow on the bone topped with garlic persillade and served with

toast points and Pascal's favorite condiments. Pascal recommends scraping the bone barrow off and mixing with the condiments—the way he enjoys it. While bone marrow is now somewhat of a trend in foodie circles, when Pascal first began serving it, no other restaurants were, and his preparation style remains singular. Another favorite on the Brasserie menu is the steak frites—a grilled, flat-iron steak served with roasted tomato and French fries.

Brasserie also offers an extensive and varied wine list, with about half of the wines from France, many at a good value. Happy hour, held from 4 to 7 p.m. Monday through Friday, at Brasserie is very popular and features sliders, small bites, Champagne cocktails, plus wine and beer. It even took home Best Happy Hour at the recent Golden Foodie Awards. The bar at Brasserie is elegant and welcoming—the perfect place to gather with friends at the end of the day. NBM

## **An Irish Gem**

Muldoon's brings the pub traditions of good food, great drinks and a fun atmosphere from across the pond.

THE TRADITION OF THE PUB (SHORT FOR PUBLIC house) spans hundreds of years and is held dear by many countries. In an unlikely location for this Emerald Isle import, Muldoon's is situated across the street from Fashion Island and offers carefully crafted food, beer and Irish whiskey lists that would make a Dubliner proud, and best of all, authentic pub culture.

Ronald Schwartz opened Muldoon's in 1974 with the late Smyth brothers. After the brothers sold their interest in the pub, Ronald took over. Now, he and his wife Sindi keep the ovens warm and the beer flowing from the taps with the help of a passionate staff. That staff includes Dudley Tomasi, the food and beverage director who shares his extensive knowledge about beer and whiskey with a smile on his face, and Lisa Teixeira, the red-haired bartender who makes any guest feel like family.

Before jumping into the food menu, sampling

one (or more) of the beers, whiskeys or wines is a must. A local craft brew like the Loakal Red from The Bruery will satisfy, or stick to an Irish classic: Guinness. Whiskey fans can sip Tullamore Dew or Bushmills, or those wanting to indulge can order a shot of the limited-quantity Midleton Very Rare. Once you have something to cleanse your palate, share some appetizers like the smoked salmon with chive mascarpone on flat bread or the salt and pepper calamari and shrimp fry with spicy chile tartar sauce. Have a sip of your beer and move onto the entrees: The Irish influence is clear in dishes like the shepherd's pie and bangers and mash. Sandwiches such as the Dublin dip and burgers such as the Celtic are good bets, but on chilly nights, dive into the Black Bush stew, which comes with a shot of Black Bush whiskey. Of the shot, Sindi advises diners: "Pour half or whole into the stew, and good luck!" Vegetarians will love The Goddess Salad, served with peach, olives, organic egg, pearl potatoes, smoked Gouda and Goddess dressing.

Leave room for dessert because Sindi Rae's dark chocolate pudding is a treat that is difficult to skip. "At about 8 o'clock at night you start hearing, 'clink clink clink' because [diners] are trying to get more out of that little cup," Sindi says. Pair it with an Irish coffee for a sweet nightcap.

Muldoon's features two pubs, which surround a large patio with plenty of outdoor seating. Drop in on Fridays or Saturdays between 9 p.m. and 1 a.m. or Sundays between 2 and 4 p.m. for free concerts outside. The bars, restaurant and patio all make for a lively, yet intimate atmosphere. "We seat almost 250 people, but it kind of feels cozy and small," Sindi says. "You can come in on a date, or after work, or in your tennis garb, and you're going to eat beautiful food in a casual way." NBM

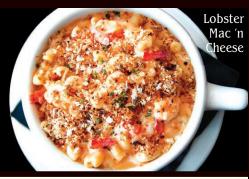

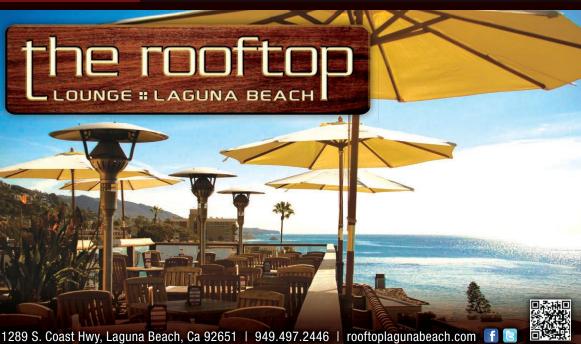

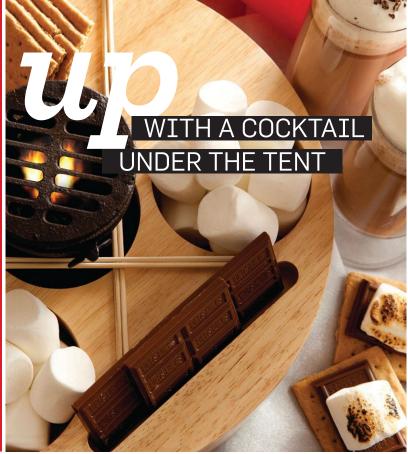

### WHY NOT IN NEWPORT?

Our guest columnist hopes to bring back the days of bands in the sand.

his isn't LA or NYC. It isn't even Memphis, Austin or Seattle. No, this is Newport Beach, a city with a rich music culture of energizing sounds and a heritage as deep as some of the best. But, today, where's the love?

Communities up and down the California coast are embracing musical talent. Huntington Beach has the annual Pier Festival; Redondo Beach, the Lobster Festival; and Doheny State Beach has Doheny Days. Similarly, Long Beach has the Funk Fest. So, why not in Newport?

Music and art festivals bring the whole local community together, and these are major money generators as well. Everybody wins!

From the birth of this city, music has been an essential element. Not only did the modern surf industry spring out of this area, but also it's here that surf music came into its own. In the 1960s, it was as plentiful as the palm trees. The legendary Rendezvous Ballroom in Balboa set the stage, until its ultimate demise in 1966, showcasing talent like The Chantays, "King of the Surf Guitar" Dick Dale and the Deltones. Plus, the Rendezvous hosted Caesar and Cleopatra (Sonny and Cher), Jackie DeShannon and the Righteous Brothers, packing in as many as 4,000 crazed teens a night.

Five decades later in 2007, during the city's

centennial celebration, a massive stage was erected on the beach just south of Newport Pier. Homegrown favorites like Sugar Ray belted out tunes to a mob of suntanned fans.

Instead of once every blue moon, how about every summer on the beach? It isn't like Newport suffers from a lack of bonafide and diverse talent. Over the decades, Newport has been, and is still home to amazing groups like the Fabulous Nomads (performing since 1962). All four current band members reside around this OC beach community. Also, world-renowned DJ Steve Aoki is a graduate of Newport Harbor High School. Even Mark McGrath (of Sugar Ray) continues to reside locally.

Just a few decades back there were numerous establishments for bands and dancing. Back in the day, this town was jumping. Woefully, venues fell by the wayside either through city ordinances or permit requirements that the establishments couldn't obtain or comply with or from other issues. It was like something out of the movie "Footloose." In the early 1990s, beach clubs and bars like the The Warehouse, Thunderbird and Josh Slocum's rose to power, and then, one by one, collapsed. Live music at venues like Parker's Seafood Grill, Red Onion and Rumpelstiltskin's all came and went.

Even the vaunted Rendezvous Surf-Fest, where

legendary bands like The Chantays and The Surfaris jammed, doesn't have enough momentum to remain an annual event. Bob Spickard of The Chantays, and co-writer of the classic surf-tune "Pipeline" reminisces, "Live music has always been a mainstay of local musicians, and fans always love to dance. I'd love to see that situation return—especially in Newport."

Fortunately, Siena in Balboa, Blue Beet, Woody's Wharf and even American Legion Hall are still offering fantastic talent, albeit on a smaller scale.

The annual Taste Of Newport at Fashion Island, and Jazz Festival at the Hyatt (plus the former Fashion Island summer concert series) produce recognized musicians and big crowds. Alas, none feature youth-centric bands or oceanfront locales. The new Pacific Festival and the Balboa Beach Music Fest are coming in just shy of the mark.

OC is ready to see the rebirth of a truly diverse and progressive music festival on the sand. For this to happen, the city needs to reduce the red tape for obtaining permits and provide temporary waivers to restrictive ordinances. However, the long-term solution lies in changing the laws and regulations. If the business owners, event planners and residents make the case and push hard, this town just might sing a new tune. NBM
